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Selection of Resources for the Urban and Community Gardening Collection at the Charles L. Durham Library of the Free Library of Philadelphia

#### Introduction

The Charles L. Durham Branch Library is the second smallest branch of the Free Library of Philadelphia. Located in West Philadelphia, it serves the Mantua and Powelton neighborhoods. The Durham branch shares the same mission as the Free Library of Philadelphia, to "advance literacy, guide learning, and inspire curiosity" (Free Library of Philadelphia, 2012a, 2012c).

The Durham Library serves a population of 13,734 people (City-Data, 2011a, 2011b). Based on previous demographic research for the Mantua and Powelton neighborhoods, the general user community for Durham Library is largely English speaking, single, young adults and children, mostly of African American ethnicity (Smith, 2012).

The Charles L. Durham library is developing a subject collection on urban and community gardening that coincides with the recent release of First Lady Michelle Obama's book, *American Grown: The Story of the White House Kitchen Garden and Gardens Across America*. This book not only offers readers a look at the implementation and growth of the public garden at the White House, but is generating conversation nationwide on how gardens and community gardens can serve as a learning platform for promoting healthy living among families and children (Amazon, 2012).

The urban and community garden subject collection has the potential to serve many populations in the Durham Library area. Its primary users will likely be community organizations, including leaders of the organization as well as members, and families, including

parents and children. The Mantua and Powelton neighborhoods have a strong community organization presence, many with the potential to institute or help in an urban and/or community garden effort (Free Library of Philadelphia, 2012b; Mantua Community Improvement Committee, 2012; Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, 2011). There is also an established interest in community gardening by organizations in the area (McKechnie, 2012; Summer Winter Community Garden, N.D.). Another primary user group of this collection is families and children. A quarter of the population in Mantua is comprised of school age children (City-Data, 2011b).

The following selection criteria were used for the urban and community garden collection. Criteria outline standards for inclusion (or exclusion), providing a consistent approach to selection (Evans & Saponaro, 2012, p. 71). These criteria were established by reviewing and evaluating selection policies from the Free Library of Philadelphia, Brooklyn Public Library of Brooklyn, NY, Arizona State Library, Memorial Hall Library of Andover, MA, and recommendations by Choice magazine:

- Attention of critics, reviewers, media, and the public
- Suitability of format for library use and content
- Suitability of subject and style for the intended audience
- Authority, reputation, or qualifications of the author, artist, publisher, or producer
- Organization and ease of use; clarity, accuracy, and logic of presentation
- Currency of information
- Cost

### Selection Aids Used: The Earth Friendly Gardening Blog

(http://earthfriendlygardening.wordpress.com/2006/02/18/review-garden-gate-magazine/) provides a positive review ("A" rating overall) based on the magazine's "high quality" content and "no ad" policy. Library Journal's article "Collection Development 'Regional Gardening': North by Northeast" suggests this title when building a gardening subject collection. WorldCat indicates 418 libraries have this magazine.

**Selection Justification:** As this magazine is geared especially for North East gardening and is free of ads, the content is very appropriate for the Durham community. Plus, the Garden Gate website offers users "web extras" free of charge that include informative videos that augment its articles; this promotes the goal of the Philadelphia Free Library to provide electronic resources.

Price: \$20/year (6 issues). Price provided by Ulrich's International Periodical Directory.

**Selection Aids Used:** Author's website gave additional information about the book that I couldn't find elsewhere as well as credentials. Booklist provided a star review of the book and Library Journal noted it as a bestseller in 2011, all of which was a good indication of its quality. WorldCat shows 591 libraries owning the item.

**Selection Justification:** This book's status based on critic reviews makes it an excellent selection choice. It meets all seven selection criteria and is directly tied to the goals and objectives of this subject collection.

**Price:** \$24.95 provided by Booklist review. Amazon indicates a Kindle version for \$0.99, but not sure about this price for a public library's use.

**Selection Aids Used:** Internet Scout provides reviews of websites by information professionals (Evans & Saponaro, 2012). Library Journal featured a review of this website and stated the "cartoon illustrations" and language choices made the site very accessible.

**Selection Justification:** As children and community organizations such as schools are a primary audience for this subject collection, I wanted to select a resource suitable for this audience. This resource can be used by children at home or by schools interested in starting a garden. The

website has two positive reviews, one from Internet Scout the other from Library Journal. It also meets all seven criteria.

Price: Website: free digital resource. CD: \$16.99 provided by website itself.

On their website, National Public Lands Day promotes its partnership with ACGA, linking to this website. The Government's United We Serve campaign cites this website numerous times as a resource for getting involved with community gardening.

**Selection Justification:** As the entire purpose of ACGA is to promote community involvement through gardening, it seems a vital resource to have available to the Durham community. It's a canonical resource and would likely be consulted in any community gardening effort around the U.S.

**Selection Aids Used:** The film's website provided reviews, press attention, and a preview of the movie. Utne Reader gave a positive review of the film. Library websites (Ann Arbor, Kalamazoo, New Haven, etc.) announced movie screenings which demonstrates public interest in the film and subject. IMDd rates the film 9 out of 10 through user reviews.

**Selection Justification:** This film is a great demonstration of how a blighted area, much like that surrounding Durham Library, can become a source of inspiration and power for a community. It meets nearly all criteria with the exception of cost.

**Price:** \$19.95 for DVD; \$150 for public library license provided by the film's website: <u>http://www.urbanrootsamerica.com/urbanrootsamerica.com/Home.html</u>

**Selection Aids Used:** ACGA provides a link to this resource on its website. As ACGA is a reputability, nonprofit organization, their recommendation comes highly regarded. A subject

annotated bibliography from graduate research at Webster University indicated this resource as "invaluable."

**Selection Justification:** This selection meets nearly all criteria. Its ready-to-distribute format makes it a perfect resource for organizations in the Durham Library area looking for a quick-reference guide for getting started on a project.

**Price:** Free digital resource, though permission must be obtained to make copies. This information provided by the University of Missouri Extension's website. <u>http://extension.missouri.edu/publications/copy.aspx</u>

Also, by using the "Look Inside" feature on Amazon, I could get a feel for the contents, organization, and ease of use of the book. This helped determine to purchase the book in print format versus e-book.

**Selection Justification:** This book meets all criteria. It has received much attention from critics and reviewers, all positive. It's is also very current and provides the Durham community a look at heirloom gardening, not something addressed in any other selection.

**Selection Aids Used:** Library Journal suggested this book is appropriate for creating collection in conjunction with Michelle Obama's book. GoodReads gave public opinion of the book, all of which is positive. Also, by using the "Look Inside" feature on Amazon, I could get a feel for the contents, organization, and ease of use of the book. This helped determine to purchase the book in print format versus e-book. The publisher's website, Adams Media, provided a summary of the book and the author's credentials.

**Selection Justification:** In addition to meeting all criteria, this is the only book selection aimed at families. Not only does it provide sound gardening advice in a monthly format, it presents readers with projects and recipes centered around the garden to do as a family. The book's theme of 'gardening as a family' is directly connected to this subject collections' goals.

Price: \$11.53 (discounted) from Adams Media website, the book's publisher.

#### **Selection Process of Retrospective Material**

To select retrospective material for the community and urban gardening subject collection, the following selection process was implemented. All of the selection criteria used to select the current materials was used to select retrospective materials. While retrospective purchases made in a public library are often for replacement copies, as this is a new collection for the Durham Library, retrospective selection will be made to identify those resources of continuing value (Evans & Saponaro, 2012, p. 92). Retrospective materials are selected when current materials are not adequate to address specific information needs. For example, the first retrospective selection below, *Month-by-Month Gardening in Pennsylvania*, while approximately ten years old addresses a topic that is so specific it is not available in popular current media.

The first step in selecting retrospective materials is to assess what information is missing or not presented through current materials selections. Gaps are noted and used to identify retrospective materials. This process is different from selecting current materials because with retrospective selection, format variety is not as big a driving force, but rather content.

The following three selection aids are useful for selection of older materials:

 Book Review Index Online: This database is helpful because it a comprehensive resource for reviews dating back to 1965. For searches (subject, title, author, etc.) it provides a list of all reviews and review sources.

- Subject Bibliographies: This selection aid is helpful because they are often developed by experts in a field who can provide citations to resources not ordinarily found through popular selection aids like review sources.
- Subject Databases: This selection aid is helpful because a particular database can provide background information about identified gap topics as well as citations to resources that may not appear in reviews.

**Selection Aids Used:** GoodReads provides very positive reviews (4.11 out of 5 stars) by readers. Amazon.com was helpful in providing users' opinions on differences between different editions of this book. Also, by using the "Look Inside" feature on Amazon, I could get a feel for the contents, organization, and ease of use of the book.

**Selection Justification:** \*This book was revised and republished in 2006, however based on reviews from Amazon, I elected to select the 2001 edition. Amazon users noted the 2006 edition virtually eliminated the vegetable section that was present in the 2001 edition. It would be advisable to purchase both versions to have more current information plus detailed information for vegetables. Meets nearly all criteria and is the only selection aimed specially that the Pennsylvania geographic area with respect to gardening.

**Selection Aids Used:** The publisher's website, Lakeshore, provided an opportunity to listen to some CD tracks and learn about the intended audience. **Selection Justification:** Meets nearly all criteria. This selection is the only CD and serves the primary audience of school-age children and families. The Big book format is appropriate for this audience and can serve as inspiration for gardening among families.

Though the process is elaborate, this assignment has been informative and demonstrates that the time and effort used for collection development is merited. Throughout the selection process, I constantly felt that a second opinion as to a material's worth and value to the collection would be helpful. In an actual library setting, having another librarian or selection committee would be extremely valuable not only for advisement but to help eliminate bias as well. This assignment opened my eyes to the wealth of selection aids available. When I typed up the list of selection aids to include in the introduction, I was shocked at how many aids I actually consulted. While the assignment and process have been long, I very much appreciate the opportunity to experience selection and collection development as a whole. It will be valuable in any information work environment in the future.

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
